Jenners Crossroads Cemetery in Somerset County is located just beyond Jennerstown, a village of less than 700. My grandparents are buried there with other relatives on my mother's side. I've made plans to be buried there too. From the cemetery, the Laurel Mountains can be seen in the distance.

One morning, peddling a stationary bike at the Jewish Community Center, I overheard a man mention Jennerstown. He was raised in that area and knew some of my relatives. We discovered we'll be interred in the same cemetery. He actually had photos of the cemetery on his cell phone and began showing them to me, commenting on the beautiful mountains rising in the distance. While discussing where we'll be buried, a man near to us said, "Stop the morbid talk! I don't want to hear about death at the gym; I'm trying to get into shape!" We changed our conversation.

Holy Week is morbid. Jesus dies. Joseph of Arimathea put Jesus' body in a tomb. When facing circumstances like death, faith is most meaningful. We express daring trust in God. That's what was happening the morning I met the man at the gym. We were sharing our daring, abiding trust that Jenners Crossroads Cemetery will not be our last stop. God's final word will be life.

Make plans to join the church in Holy Week and on Easter Sunday. Easter silences all cemetery talk. God is stronger than death and will raise us to life. This good news in Christ is the daring, abiding faith we're called to share.

Happy Easter to all! Christ is risen!

Thank God for our food



God said [to Adam and Eve], 'See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food .-Genesis 1:29

There's an old joke about the first-grade teacher who asks her class, "Where do apples come from?" Little Ian speaks up: "From the supermarket!"

We laugh, but the sad truth is that many of us are so far removed from farms that we forget that our food – every bite – comes from life, life that God alone created. Yes, farmers sow seeds and care for the plants and trees, but it's God's miracle of life that makes them grow.

As stewards and disciples, we desire to cultivate in ourselves and our communities a deep appreciation for all God provides us, particularly what we need to live. With every mouthful at every meal, we thank God for our daily bread, and for the soil, air and water that sustains life.

Easter and springtime are perfect occasions to celebrate God's miracle of life that gives us fruit, vegetables, grains, meat, fish and dairy foods. Here are some ideas:

- Mealtime grace, thank God not only for food, but also for the cycles of seedtime, growth and harvest; for life-nourishing soil, water and air.
- While eating, discuss the origins of the variety of food on your plate. How and where are the plants grown? How do they get to your kitchen?
- As a church or family, celebrate Earth Day (Saturday, April 22) by learning about food production and how climate change, pollution and economics impact our food.
- Celebrate Earth Day by planting a garden in your yard or community garden on church grounds.
- Learn about nutrition -- what foods are the best and worst for us, and why. Promote healthy eating.
- Learn about food waste in our culture and take steps to reduce it in your home.
- At church, reserve a Sunday for a service highlighting creation and food. Maybe "Blessing of the Seeds," or the ancient "Rogation Sunday" ritual.

We live in a culture where food is all around us all the time. As steward-disciples, we want to be sure not to take even a mouthful for granted.

First Holy Communion...For those second graders [and older children who have not yet been instructed], First Communion instruction dates are listed below. The children who receive instruction will celebrate their First Holy Communion at the 10:00 liturgy on Sunday, May 14.

Full participation in the Eucharistic life of the Church is a milestone in a young person's life for "at the table of our Lord Jesus Christ, God nourishes faith, forgives sin, and calls us to be witnesses to the Gospel."

Parish practices vary widely on the age and circumstances for full participation in the Lord's Supper. However, it was over 30 years ago that the Lutheran Church in America

separated "confirmation" and the reception of Holy Communion. Since that time, congregations have continued to lower the age at which children are instructed and invited to commune.

First Communion instruction in Eastertide 2023 will be offered on Saturday mornings, *promptly at 10:00 AM*, on April 29 and May 6 & 13. Classes will be one hour in length. <u>Attendance is required!</u> Parents of students [particularly, if this is a first child receiving instruction] are encouraged to attend.

Questions with regard to communion practices and/or First Communion instruction are welcome and should be directed to the Pastor. Please contact him also if you have scheduling conflicts with the above dates.

Genuine, Spirit-filled fasting calls for intentional preparation. Such fasting calls for the following as a minimum:

- Examine your motives (Isa. 58:3-7
- Surrender your life fully to Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior (Rom. 12:1,2)
- Ask God to reveal your sins to you (Ps. 19:12)
- Confess your sins (1 John 1:9)
- Seek forgiveness from those you have offended (Mark 11:25; Luke 17:3,4)
- Make restitution as the Holy Spirit leads (Matt. 5:23-26)
- Ask God to fill you with His Holy Spirit (Eph. 5:18)
- consult with your physician before beginning a fast of any length.

What to do while fasting...

- Pray (Dan. 9:3; Acts 14:23);
- Meditate on the Word of God (Ps. 1:1,2; Col. 3:16).
- Meditate on the attributes of God: love, grace, wisdom, compassion, sovereignty (Pss. 48:9, 10; 103:1-13).
- Expect God to bless you and reveal Himself to you (Heb. 11:6).
- Do not underestimate spiritual opposition (Gal. 5:16, 17)
- Refuse to yield to your worldly nature (Rom. 12:1.2).
- Exhibit an attitude of joy (Zech. 8:19; Matt, 6:17,18).


A CALL TO A VIGIL OF PRAYER AROUND-THE-CLOCK DAILY THROUGHOUT HOLY WEEK

Pastor Doug is participating and invites you to join with your congregational family members in the Holy Week Vigil of Prayer. Around-the-clock, prayers of confession, adoration, thanksgiving, intercession and petition will be brought before our Heavenly Father's throne of grace.

Each participant will select one or more hours in the Holy Week during which they will maintain the Vigil.

A guidebook listing congregational members, missionaries, church leaders, governmental officials, the afflicted and homebound, as well as many others in need of prayer, is provided.

Too, in the guidebook you will find suggestions for opening and closing your hour of prayer. Common prayers in the booklet, hymnal, or supplemental prayerbook may assist you.

You will find the hour to pass very quickly!

You need not come to the church sanctuary to pray [although you are welcome]. Participants may pray at home, allowing a fuller participation in the Vigil by our home-bound and out-of-town members.

A large posterboard is located in the Narthex, providing spaces on which you can reserve your hours of participation in the Vigil. Or, you may call the Church Office during regular office hours to reserve your Vigil time.

God has appointed prayer as His method for conferring the blessings we all need, whether spiritual or temporal, for He has ordained that prayer shall be one of the causes that occasions His divine intervention.

Please join together with your fellow members in these great hours of prayer.





The focus of Holy Thursday is not merely the "anniversary" of the institution of the Lord's Supper, but rather an openheartedness to Jesus' commandments: Love one another even as I have loved you, and Do this in remembrance of me. Our worship liturgy will proclaim the loving servanthood of Christ. Following the Eucharist, the Altar is striped to signify Jesus' betrayal, being stripped of His glory and willingly placed into the hands of His captors.

Good Friday April 7 at 7:30 pm



Our Tenebrae Liturgy is an adaptation of the ancient office of light dimming used to impress upon the hearts and minds of believers the awful consequences of sin and magnitude of our Savior's sacrifice. The liturgy includes hymns [sung without accompaniment], readings which trace the experience of our Lord from His trial before Pilate to His crucifixion, death and burial, and prayers. Worshipers sense the grueling ordeal as the path of Jesus is traced through the sanctuary.

Recycling Opportunity

Michael Brothers located at <u>901 Horning Rd</u>. Pittsburgh, PA 15236 offers fantastic recycling opportunities!

This is a drive-thru location open Monday-Friday 7am-5pm and Saturday 7am-1pm.

At this location, you can recycle:

Glass

Plastics #1-7

Christmas lights

Aluminum/cans

Metal

Cardboard



Smaller plastic items are a problem at automated recycling centers but NOT a problem at Michael Bros so many items can be recycled that cannot be recycled at other locations. They also take ALL plastics-not just #1 and #2.

You just drive up to Michael Bros (very well marked) and someone will be there to help you place your items in the correct bins. You do not need to separate the different plastics but you do need to separate the glass from the cans from the cardboard from the plastic.

Below are examples of many hard to recycle items that Michael Bros will accept:

Disposable utensils
Cups/lids
Take-out containers
Clam shells for berries, take-out, etc
Packaging for things like electronics
cartons
Bread tabs

yogurt containers prescription bottles/lids straws coffee cup lids caps/pull tabs from milk/juice

flower pots (cleaned)

You can participate in the electronic giving program immediately. Just visit our church website and look for the "Donate Now" button.



I'd always skimmed over the earthquake in Matthew's resurrection story (28:1-10) until I was in "a big one." I live in Alaska. There hadn't been "a big one" in my part of the state since Good Friday 1964, when a 9.2 shaker on the Richter scale destroyed homes, killed dozens and forced the relocation of Southcentral Alaska coastal towns decimated by tidal waves.

Scientists warned there would eventually be another big one here. I was making breakfast for my children in 2018 when it hit—a 7.1 quake. I was downstairs with the 2-year-old when the shaking started. I knew I was supposed to shelter in place—stop moving!—but my 5-year-old was somewhere upstairs alone, and he started screaming. I was filled with terror. Bookshelves flung their contents; photos sailed off the mantle. The shaking was the hardest I'd ever felt, and it just kept going.

I grabbed my toddler and tried to run upstairs, but the shaking made it difficult to walk. A massive chandelier was swinging wildly above my head, and I saw the folly in climbing the stairs under it while holding a toddler. Glass shattered upstairs. My 5-year-old was still screaming. Was he hurt? I was screaming. We were all afraid.

After less than a minute of shaking, which felt like an hour, everything was still. I went upstairs and stopped short: a sea of broken glass filled the hall and bathroom floor. A wall-mounted bathroom mirror had shattered and sent shards throughout the hall, nearly into my son's bedroom. My son, who I thought might have been in the bathroom, was safe on his bedroom floor. I felt a moment of joy amid the terror.

Mary Magdalene and the other Mary who walked to the tomb went there expecting death. They were already traumatized by the terror of seeing their beloved Jesus beaten and executed. Then the earth began to quake, and they were afraid all over again.

Instead of broken glass, they saw blinding light and an angel, who shone with painful brightness. Do not be afraid, the angel said, he has been raised. The women were still filled with terror but something else crept in—great joy. They ran to tell the disciples and met the risen Lord on the way.

The Easter story is one of interwoven fear and joy—the same is true in our lives. We don't have to live on a fault line to feel the ground move beneath our feet. We have all felt the earth quake, so to speak. It's the phone call that begins with "sit down." It's the doctor with bad news from the PET scan. It's the realization that you can't fix the relationship. It's the realization that you can't fix your child. It's another month when the money runs out before the month does. We have all lived through some kind of earth-quaking experience. We have all felt fear.

Yet sometimes it is precisely in the shaking that we get a glimpse of great joy. Someone you love is holding your hand. A member of your church brings a hot meal. A Scripture verse brings a word of comfort. God's peace comes unexpectedly. Someone offers you forgiveness. Someone sits quietly beside you.

The women at the tomb didn't suddenly drop their fears when they learned that Jesus was alive. The women ran to tell the good news while they were full of fear and joy. The same may be true for us. They were afraid, but they went anyway. They didn't go alone—they had each other—and as they went, they found Jesus. I can think of worse metaphors for the life of a disciple.

Right after the quake of 2018, my children and I were together on the floor of my older son's room when the first big aftershock came, a 5.7. Aftershocks always come after a big quake, and you can't predict them. The aftershock was another big jolt, but this time it was different. We sat with our arms around each other and a few stuffed animals thrown in for good measure. We were afraid but thankful to be together.

"No storm can shake my inmost calm" read the words of the hymn "My Life Flows On in Endless Song" (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, 763). This is not entirely true when I'm relying on a calm I must manufacture. I can't manufacture it. But God can. Our inner calm is God's own peace, given by the Spirit.

What I know from Christ's death and resurrection is that God doesn't promise a life of steady ground. God promises God's presence in the shaking and the joy of God's loving embrace.

God says to us what Jesus said to those fearful and joyful women at the tomb: you will see me. It's a solid foundation on which to rest. †

God's work. Our hands.

- 1 Remember in prayer the diverse gifts, stories and cultures of our Arab and Middle Eastern siblings in Christ, who remind us of the church's rich history and tradition. Ask God to bless the advocacy, witness, leadership development and ministry support provided by ELCA Arab and Middle Eastern Ministries and the Association of Lutherans of Arab and Middle Eastern Heritage.
- **2** Palm Sunday Pray for strength to follow Christ and the will of God, especially when fear of criticism or standing out discourages us from proclaiming and demonstrating our faith.
- 3 Give thanks for the chance to study, pray, reflect and give during ELCA World Hunger's 40 Days of Giving, joining partners, companions, friends and neighbors around the world in doing God's work
- 4 "How precious is your steadfast love, O God! All people may take refuge in the shadow of your wings" (Psalm 36:7). Give thanks and praise for God's love and grace, which envelop all people and are never deterred by borders, divisions or regulations of our making.
- 5 Remember in prayer people who live in despair and yearn for hope, especially those recovering from natural disasters, incarcerated in prisons and jails, displaced by war and economic crises, or suffering poverty, hunger, unemployment or lack of shelter.
- 6 Maundy Thursday When we gather for communion with our siblings in Christ, we remember when Jesus gathered with disciples, friends and strangers around a meal. Give thanks for the bread and wine that remind us of God's abundant mercy and the sacrificial love of Jesus Christ, providing us the nourishment to live our baptismal call, walk in God's ways, serve our neighbor and share the gospel.
- 7 Good Friday Ask the Spirit to renew and strengthen our faith as we recall the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus for the sake of the world. Pray that our hope will be stirred and our lives energized by God's grace, given despite our complexity, weakness and suffering.
- **8** Holy Saturday Give thanks that darkness and death no longer hold us captive God's promise of forgiveness, freedom and new life has been fulfilled for us in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.
- 9 Easter Sunday "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised" (Matthew 28:5-6). Praise God! Give thanks that our lives, purpose and hope are forever changed in the risen Christ, God's tangible expression of love and mercy for humankind.
- 10 Give thanks for musicians, choirs, cantors, music directors, orchestras and bands that give witness to our faith, draw us into worship and reflection, and help us express our joy and praise to God.
- 11 Remember in prayer ELCA missionaries and Young Adults in Global Mission serving alongside our companions in Germany, Austria, Belgium and the United Kingdom.
- 12 Give thanks for God's steadfast love and kindness, which are so often obscured by our daily activities, concerns and distractions.
- 13 Pray for students in our seminaries who, responding to the Spirit's call, explore opportunities for ministry and service wherever God is at work in the world.
- 14 Pray for the Peace Not Walls campaign as we work for justice, peace, human rights, reconciliation and healing in Palestine and Israel. Ask that our efforts might yield results as we accompany the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land and all Jews, Christians and Muslims working together for peace with justice.
- 15 Give thanks for teachers in our public schools and pray that God will sustain and renew their energy and commitment as they manage the challenges of their vocation. Ask the Spirit to grant them compassion, wisdom and skill to attend to the needs of students and parents, and promise to generously support their service.

- 16 The story of Thomas, who was skeptical when Jesus first appeared to the disciples after his resurrection, is not unlike our own when we feel doubt and yearn for proof of God's presence and love. Ask God to forgive our uncertainty, and pray that our faith, like Thomas', will be renewed, so that we, too, might proclaim of Jesus, "My Lord and my God!" (John 20:28).
- 17 Pray for our presiding bishop, Elizabeth A. Eaton, that the Spirit will sustain her faith and wisdom and continue to equip her for guiding our church through the challenges of doing God's work in an ever-changing world.
- 18 Ask God to help us serve our neighbors in need, share the gospel, endure all hardships in this world and find comfort in the assurance of "an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven" (1 Peter 1:4).
- 19 Remember in prayer ELCA missionaries and Young Adults in Global Mission serving alongside our companions in Mexico, Bolivia, Colombia, Chile, Argentina, Uruguay, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica and Brazil.
- **20** Pray for God's counsel in how to be a positive, compassionate and healing influence in society and the world, following the path of life, light and truth.
- 21 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Western Iowa and Southwestern Texas synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.
- 22 Earth Day Praise God for the diverse and abundant natural resources that sustain life, the interconnection of all that exists, and the wonders of creation that inspire and humble us. Pray that we will wisely steward what God has entrusted to our care and work diligently to restore what we have damaged and depleted for the well-being of humanity and the honor of our Creator.
- 23 Pray that we might take advantage of opportunities to talk with one another about our faith, our questions, our thoughts and the challenges of following Christ.
- 24 Pray for farmers, ranchers and agricultural workers who, each spring, prepare, plant and tend fields, orchards and herds so that they will produce bountiful harvests and feed the world.
- 25 Rejoice in the good news that God has reclaimed us with the blood of Christ Savior, Messiah and Teacher, the light of the world and the bread of life that sustains our spirit.
- 26 Remember in prayer musicians and worship leaders gathering online for the Music that Makes Community webinar "Composing Ourselves: A Laboratory for Creating Congregational Songs." Pray that the Spirit will inspire and nurture their skills for writing new worship songs drawn from diverse cultures and traditions.
- 27 Thank God for listening and responding to our prayers, both spoken and silent.
- 28 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Minneapolis Area, Northern Texas-Northern Louisiana and Alaska synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.
- 29 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Northwest Intermountain Synod, the Northeastern Minnesota Synod and the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.
- **30** Pray that our faith might grow and mature as the Spirit guides and encourages us through worship, service, Bible study, involvement in a faith community, and the witness of our global companions.






